





- » Dovizioso's only podium finish in the smaller classes at Valencia was in his Championship-winning season back in 2004, when he finished second in the 125cc race.
- » His first podium in the MotoGP™ class at the Ricardo Tormo circuit is third in 2011 riding a Honda, when he also set the fastest lap of the race.
- » In 2014, Dovizioso was fourth in Valencia and in 2015, he was the first Ducati rider across the line in Valencia in seventh. He again finished seventh at the circuit in 2016.
- » In 2017, Dovizioso had a chance to clinch the title against Marquez, but he crashed out of the race on Lap 25 while sitting in fourth.
- » Last year, he qualified in third place and quickly moved up to second before the race was red flagged due to weather conditions. In the restarted race, he took the lead on Lap 2 and took the win - the first for Ducati at Valencia since Casey Stoner in 2008.

- » Petrucci won the European Superstock 600 Championship race at Valencia in 2009.
- » He raced in MotoGP™ at Valencia for the first time in 2012 and had his best result of his rookie season, finishing in eighth place.
- » In 2013, he finished 14th, and in 2014 he finished 12th having started the race down in 21st place on the grid.
- » In 2015, he qualified and finished in 10th place and in 2016, he qualified in 12th place and finished the race in the same position.
- » In 2017, he started his 100th Grand Prix race from 15th on the grid to finish the race in 13th as the second Ducati rider.
- » Last year, he qualified in fourth as the highest-placed Independent Team rider but crashed out of the race at Turn 13 while sitting in fifth.


- » Viñales has had two GP wins at Valencia: the 125cc race in 2011 and the Moto3™ race in 2013 to win the world title.
- » In 2014, he crashed out of the Moto2™ race at the last corner of the first lap and collided with Kallio.
- » In 2015, he finished 11th after being pushed wide at the second corner and ending the first lap in 17th place.
- » In 2016, he qualified in fourth place, was as high as third during the race but finished in fifth position.
- » In 2017, he qualified in 13th and finished the race in 12th, which was his worst result across the line of the season.
- » Last year, he qualified on pole position for the first time since Aragon back in 2017, but he crashed out on Lap 12 of the first race at Turn 14 while sitting in fourth place. He didn't start the second race.

- » He won the Moto2™ race at Valencia in 2010 from ninth on the grid, also setting the fastest lap of the race - his only victory in Grand Prix racing so far
- » In 2017, Abraham qualified in 18th and finished the race in 14th and last year, he qualified in 18th and managed to finish the restarted race in 14th.

- » In 2015, he returned to the Moto3™ grid after missing the previous five races due to an ankle injury sustained at Misano.
- » 2019 will be Quartararo's first race in Valencia on a MotoGP™ bike; although he rode at the track during the Official Test last November where he set the 17th fastest time overall.

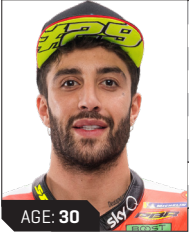

- » Last year was Morbidelli's first race in MotoGP™ at Valencia; he qualified 15th, worked his way through to fifth before and the crashed on Lap 12. He didn't manage to get his bike to the box for the second start.

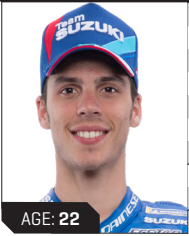

- » Iannone's only podium in the smaller classes in Valencia is second in the Moto2™ race in 2010 when he was leading on the final lap before being clipped by Elias.
- » In 2013, his rookie year in the MotoGP™ class, he crashed out of the race in the closing stages.
- » In 2014, he qualified in second, but finished down in 22nd place having called into the pits to change bikes when it started to rain.
- » In 2015, he was the top Ducati rider in qualifying in seventh but crashed out on the third lap.
- » In 2016, Iannone finished on the podium for the first time in MotoGP™ at the circuit, taking third on his final appearance for the Ducati Team.
- » In 2017, Iannone qualified in third —his second front row start of the year— and finished the race in sixth as the second Suzuki rider.
- » Last year, he qualified seventh but crashed out from fifth at Turn 12 on his final appearance with Suzuki.

- » In 2017, Rins qualified 10th but worked his way through the field to finish 4th, the best result of his rookie season in the MotoGP™ class.

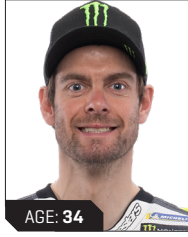

- » In 2012, he qualified on pole for the Moto2™ race, then crashed on the eighth lap when battling for third place; restarting to finish eighth.
- » He crashed in 2013 after starting from pole, crashing on Lap 8 while leading and restarting to finish 29th.
- » He finished sixth in 2014 at Valencia, and fifth in 2015—his equal best result of that season.
- » In 2016, he finished the race in sixth position after having qualified in sixth —his last race with Monster Yamaha Tech 3.
- » In 2017, he qualified in 11th, but had to start from the pitlane for exceeding his engine allocation. He then crashed out from 15th.
- » Last year, he qualified in sixth place and finished third despite crashing before the restart. It was the first podium finish for a KTM rider in the premier class and his first podium in MotoGP™.

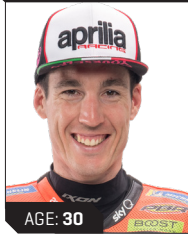

- » Crutchlow won the World Supersport race at Valencia in 2009 and finished seventh and ninth in the two World Superbike races in 2010 after qualifying on pole.
- » In 2011 he finished fourth at Valencia – his best result in his rookie season in MotoGP™
- » In 2012 he crashed out on the 23rd lap when in second place.
- » In 2013, he crashed out on the tenth lap in Valencia, and in 2014 he finished fifth on his final ride with the Ducati factory team.
- » In 2015 he had to start from the back of the grid after suffering technical problems; he finished the race ninth after ending the first lap in 24th place.
- » In 2016, he crashed out at the final corner on Lap 17 and in 2017, he qualified in 16th after crashing in Q1, working his way through the field in the race to finish eighth.
- » Last year, he missed the Valencia GP due a right ankle injury sustained at Phillip Island. He was replaced by Stefan Bradl.

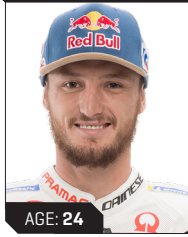

- » He qualified in ninth in 2016 and again finished the race in eighth.
- » In 2017, he qualified eighth but crashed out on Lap 4.
- » Last year, he qualified eighth to make it six manufacturers within the top eight but crashed out at Turn 3 on Lap 3.

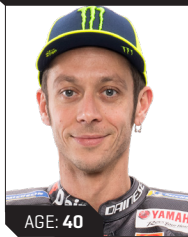

- » Rossi has had two MotoGP™ victories at the Ricardo Tormo circuit, in 2003 on a Honda and in 2004 riding a Yamaha.
- » In addition to the two victories, Rossi has had six other podiums at Valencia.
- » In 2014, he qualified on pole and finished second —his first podium at the circuit since 2010.
- » In 2015, he finished fourth despite starting the race at the back of the grid for his infringement in Malaysia, and in 2016 he again finished fourth.
- » In 2017, Rossi qualified seventh and crossed the line fourth as the second Yamaha rider.
- » Last year, he qualified 16th, which, barring 2015 and his penalty, was his worst starting position at Valencia since he was 17th in 2007. He moved up to third in the early stages of the first race before the red flag. He crashed out of second at Turn 12 with five laps to go, remounting to finish 13th.

- » Last year, Rabat missed the Valencia GP due to a leg injury sustained at the British GP and he was replaced by Jordi Torres.

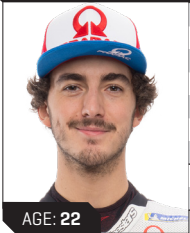

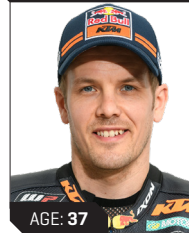

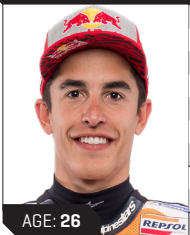

- » In 2009, Marquez finished 17th in Valencia after crashing and restarting; in 2010 he finished fourth, which was enough to give him the 125cc world title.
- » He won the Moto2™ race in 2012 in Valencia after starting from the back of the grid as a penalty for irresponsible riding during free practice.
- » He finished third in 2013 to clinch the MotoGP™ title in his rookie season, and in 2014 he won the race from fifth on the grid.
- » Marquez finished second in 2015 and 2016, losing out to Lorenzo on both occasions.
- » In 2017, he qualified on pole position for the eighth time of the year, made an incredible save at Turn 1 of Lap 24 and dropped down to fifth. He eventually managed to cross the line in third place to become the youngest ever rider to clinch four premier class world titles.
- » Last year, he crashed on his first lap in Q2, dislocating his shoulder, but managed to qualify in fifth. He then crashed out in the first race at Turn 9 on Lap 7 while sitting in third place, the only time he has failed to score points in Valencia in MotoGP™.

- » Lorenzo's only podium at Valencia in the smaller classes was 2nd in the 250cc race in 2005; he finished fourth in the 250cc race at Valencia in 2006 to clinch the world title.
- » He has had five podium finishes in the MotoGP™ class in Valencia; third in 2009 and race wins in 2010, 2013, 2015 and 2016.
- » He missed the Valencia GP in 2011 as he had not recovered from a crash at Phillip Island.
- » In 2015, he was on pole, won the race, set a new lap record and clinched the MotoGP™ world title.
- » In 2016, in his final race for Yamaha, Lorenzo again qualified on pole, won the race and set a new lap record.
- » In 2017, Lorenzo qualified in fourth and crashed out of the race on Lap 25. He was third, just ahead of teammate Andrea Dovizioso.
- » Last year, he raced at Valencia after missing the previous four races, qualifying 13th and crossing the line in 12th on his last appearance with Ducati.

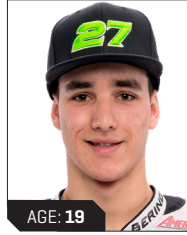

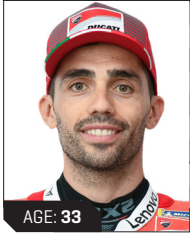

- » Pirro has competed eight times previously in Grand Prix racing at Valencia.
- » In 2011, he won his only GP race to date, in the Moto2™ class, after qualifying on pole for the first and only time so far.
- » Last year, he was also a wildcard at the Valencia GP. He qualified 12th and crossed the line fourth as the second Ducati rider - his best result at the track in the premier class.

Grand Prix racing in Valencia

This will be the 21st Grand Prix of Valencia, held at the Ricardo Tormo circuit since the first visit in 1999. Below are some facts and statistics from the previous Grand Prix events held in Valencia:

This will be the 18th successive year that Valencia has hosted the final race of the season, making it the circuit that has been the venue for the final event of the year on most occasions. It has been the final event of the year throughout the MotoGP™ era.

A total of 60 Grand Prix races for solo motorcycles have been held in Valencia since 1999 as follows: MotoGP™ - 17, 500cc - 3, Moto2™ - 9, 250cc - 11, Moto3™ - 7 and 125cc - 13.

The Valencia circuit is named after Spanish racer Ricardo Tormo, who won the 50cc world title riding for Bultaco in 1978 and 1981. In addition to his 15 Grand Prix victories in the 50cc class he also had four wins in the 125cc class. His career ended in 1984 due to leg injuries suffered in a crash whilst test riding. Tormo sadly died from leukemia in 1998.

Dani Pedrosa is the most successful rider at the Valencia circuit with seven wins; four in MotoGP™, two in 250cc, and one in the 125cc class. The next most successful rider is Jorge Lorenzo with four wins in Valencia, all in the MotoGP™ class, followed by Miguel Oliveira (2 x Moto2™, 1 x Moto3™) and Casey Stoner (2 x MotoGP™, 1 x 125cc), with three wins each.

Spanish riders have won on in the premier class of Grand Prix racing at Valencia on 10 occasions, with Sete Gibernau on a Suzuki in the 500cc class in 2001, Dani Pedrosa on a Honda in 2007, 2009, 2012 and 2017, Jorge Lorenzo on a Yamaha in 2010, 2013, 2015 and 2016, and Marc Marquez on a Honda in 2014.

From 2009 to 2018, at least one of the three classes at the Grand Prix has been won by a Spanish rider. Prior to Andrea Dovizioso last year, the last non-Spanish rider to win the MotoGP™ race in Valencia was Casey Stoner in 2011.

Since the introduction of the MotoGP™ class in 2002, Honda have had nine Grand Prix wins, the last of which was with Dani Pedrosa in 2017.

Yamaha have won the MotoGP™ race in Valencia on five occasions, including two successive years with Jorge Lorenzo in

2015 and 2016. Johann Zarco was the first Yamaha rider across the line in the MotoGP™ race over the last two years, second in 2017 and seventh last year.

Ducati have had three MotoGP™ wins in Valencia with three different riders: Troy Bayliss (2006), Casey Stoner (2008) and Andrea Dovizioso (2018).

Andrea Iannone's third-place finish in 2016 was the first podium at Valencia for a Ducati rider since Casey Stoner finished second in 2010.

The best result for Suzuki in Valencia in the MotoGP™ era is Alex Rins' second place last year. Rins was second on the grid last year at Valencia, which is his best qualifying in the MotoGP™ class to date and the best for a Suzuki rider at the track in the premier class since Kenny Roberts Jr. was on pole in 2000.

The MotoGP™ race at Valencia has only been won by a rider who has not qualified on the front row twice: Marc Marquez (2014) and Dani Pedrosa (2017), who both won the race from fifth place on the grid.

The nine Moto2™ races that have taken place in Valencia have been won by eight different riders: Karel Abraham (2010), Michele Pirro (2011), Marc Marquez (2012), Nico Terol (2013), Tom Lüthi (2014), Tito Rabat (2015), Johann Zarco (2016) and Miguel Oliveira (2017 and 2018). Only three of them have won from pole position: Michele Pirro, Tito Rabat and Johann Zarco.

The seven Moto3™ races that have taken place in Valencia have been won by seven different riders: Danny Kent (2012), Maverick Viñales (2013), Jack Miller (2014), Miguel Oliveira (2015), Brad Binder (2016), Jorge Martín (2017) and Can Öncü (2018). Only Jorge Martín has won from pole position at the track in the class.

Can Öncü, 2018 Red Bull MotoGP Rookies Cup winner, was a wildcard at the Valencia GP last year, becoming the first Turkish rider to race in the Moto3™ class. Aged 15 years and 115 days old on race day, he became the youngest rider to win a Grand Prix, taking the record from Scott Redding who was 15 years and 170 days old at the British GP in 2008. He also became the first Turkish rider to win a Grand Prix race.

Previously... in MotoGP™

395 - Since the opening race of the year in Qatar, Marc Marquez has accumulated 395 points, taking the record in a single season set by Jorge Lorenzo in 2010 - 383 points (since the current point scoring system was introduced in 1993).

139 - After the Malaysian GP, Marc Marquez has a 139-point lead over Andrea Dovizioso, closing on the biggest margin at the end of a premier class season set by Valentino Rossi in 2005, who had a 147-point advantage over Marco Melandri (with 17 races in 2005 compared to 19 in 2019, and since the point scoring system was introduced in 1993.)

45 - Valentino Rossi, who crossed the line fourth in Malaysia, has not won since Assen back in 2017 (45 successive races), which is now the longest winless streak in his Grand Prix career.

27 - Over the last 27 races he has finished, Marc Marquez has always been on the podium and finished third only once, in Brno last season.

10 - Clinching the Moto2™ title in Malaysia, Alex gave the Marquez family its 10th World Championship: 1 x 125cc, 1 x Moto3™, 2 x Moto2™ and 6 x MotoGP™.

7 - Lorenzo Dalla Porta won for the third successive time at Sepang, becoming the seventh rider to win three times in a row since the introduction of the Moto3™ class back in 2012.

5 - Fabio Quartararo qualified on pole position for the fifth time in his rookie season at Sepang, along with Jerez, Catalunya, Assen and Thailand. He moves above Jorge Lorenzo (2008) and Dani Pedrosa (2006), who both qualified on pole position four times in their rookie season in the MotoGP™ class. Only Marc Marquez did better, with nine poles in 2013.

MotoGP™ Facts and Stats

At the Malaysian GP, Maverick Viñales won for the second time this year along with the Dutch TT, the seventh time in the MotoGP™ class and the 23rd in his Grand Prix career, equalling Andrea Dovizioso and Barry Sheene.

In addition, this was Maverick Viñales' sixth win with Yamaha, equalling Giacomo Agostini and Luca Cadalora but two less than Max Biaggi, who is in sixth place on the list of Yamaha riders with most premier class wins.

At the Valencia GP, Maverick Viñales will be aiming to reach the milestone of 2000 points scored in Grand Prix racing, the 16th rider to do so. With his win at Sepang, he scored his 1975th point since the beginning of his career.

With his second-place finish at Sepang, Marc Marquez has been on the podium 17 times so far this year, setting a new record for the most podium finishes in a single premier class season. The previous record was 16 with Valentino Rossi (2003, 2005 and 2008), Jorge Lorenzo (2010 and 2012), Casey Stoner (2011) and Marquez (2013).

Marc Marquez made it 15 successive races on the podium for the first time since he stepped up to MotoGP™ in 2013. Only four riders have done better in the premier class: Valentino Rossi (23 from Portugal/2002 to South Africa/2004 and 16 from Japan/2014 to Great Britain/2015), Giacomo Agostini (22 from Nations/1967 to Ulster/1969), Casey Stoner (19 from Portugal/2011 to France/2012) and Mick Doohan (17 from Australia/1994 to Japan/1995).

With Maverick Viñales and Marc Marquez, this is the third Spanish 1-2 of the season and the fourth with both riders along with Austin (2018), Assen and Germany this year. It's the 50th Spanish 1-2 in the premier class of Grand Prix racing.

The Ducati Team heads to Valencia with a two-point lead over the Repsol Honda Team in the MotoGP™ Teams' World Championship and could clinch the title for the second time since the introduction of the MotoGP™ class in 2002, along with 2007.

This is Ducati's 16th podium finish of the season so far, two more than last year. The only time Ducati have had more podium finishes in the premier class was in 2007 with 19 thanks to Casey Stoner, Loris Capirossi and Alex Barros.

Valentino Rossi, who crossed the line fourth at Sepang - his best result since Misano - and set the fastest lap of the race for the first time since Le Mans 2016, has not won since Assen back in

2017, 45 successive races, which is now his largest winless streak in his Grand Prix career.

Valentino Rossi is the only rider to have competed at all 20 previous Grand Prix events that have taken place at the Ricardo Tormo circuit.

Alex Rins finished in fifth place at the Malaysian GP, equalling his best result across the line since he won at the British GP. Rins and Viñales are now the only riders still in contention for the third place in the Championship.

Fabio Quartararo, who finished seventh at Sepang, his worst result across the line since he was also seventh at Brno, is leading the Independent Team rider classification with 172 points, 23 points ahead of Jack Miller who is now the only other rider in contention.

With Franco Morbidelli and Fabio Quartararo, Petronas Yamaha SRT scored 19 more points in the Independent Team classification at Sepang, taking the title in their first year competing in the premier class of Grand Prix racing.

In Valencia, Fabio Quartararo will be aiming to become the first French rider to win in the premier class since Régis Laconi won the Valencia GP in 500cc back in 1999, more than 20 years ago.

The only one of the four rookies in the MotoGP™ class this year to have previously won the Ricardo Tormo circuit in any of the smaller classes is Miguel Oliveira, who won the Moto2™ race in both 2017 and 2018 as well as the Moto3™ race back in 2015.

However, Miguel Oliveira won't race at Valencia due to a shoulder injury sustained at Phillip Island and he will be replaced by Iker Lecuona who finished in second place in Moto2™ last year at the Spanish track, the best result of his Grand Prix career to date.

Along with Miguel Oliveira and Iker Lecuona, Joan Mir is the only other rookie who has finished on the podium in Valencia, twice in the Moto3™ class: second in 2016 and 2017.

Aged 19 years and 315 days old on race day at Valencia, Iker Lecuona will become the youngest rider to start a MotoGP™ race since Michel Fabrizio, who was 19 years and 214 days old when he lined up on the grid at Welkom back in 2004.

In addition, Lecuona will be aiming to become only the fourth rider to start a MotoGP™ race as a teenager since the introduction of the class in 2002, along with Fabio Quartararo, Michel Fabrizio and John Hopkins.

Moto2™ Facts and Stats

Brad Binder won for the seventh time in the Moto2™ class at the Malaysian GP and the fourth time this season - one more than last year. This is his 14th win overall across all classes.

In addition, with his win at Sepang, Brad Binder moved above Miguel Oliveira as the most successful KTM rider in the Moto2™ class.

This is the 25th win for a South-African rider in the intermediate category and the 53rd overall in Grand Prix racing.

Second across the line, Alex Marquez stood on the podium for the 10th time this season so far. Only once has Marquez scored 10 podiums in a single season before, it was in the Moto3™ class back in 2014, on his way to clinching his first title.

Tom Lüthi finished third at Sepang, which is his seventh podium finish of the season so far and the third in three consecutive races.

This is the first time Lüthi has had three or more successive podium finishes since 2017 (France, Italy, Catalunya, Netherlands).

This is Tom Lüthi's 54th podium finish in the intermediate category, moving up above Max Biaggi and Tetsuya Harada into second place of the list of riders with most podium finishes in the class, six less than leader Anton Mang (60 podiums).

In addition, this is Tom Lüthi's 64th podium finish in his Grand Prix career, one less than Wayne Rainey.

Xavi Vierge crossed the line in fourth place at the Malaysian GP, which is his best result since he was third in Australia last year. On his four visits to Valencia, Vierge has scored points only once, finishing 12th in 2016. However, he qualified second last year at the track.

Fabio Di Giannantonio crashed out in Malaysia, but he is still leading the fight for the Rookie of Year with 101 points, six points ahead of Enea Bastianini and 18 points ahead of Jorge Martin, who both crashed at Sepang although Bastianini managed to remount his bike and cross the line in 24th. They are the only riders still in contention.

Tom Lüthi (2014) is the only rider currently competing full-time in Moto2™ who has won in the class at Valencia.

Along with Tom Lüthi (2014, 2015 and 2016); Dominique Aegerter

(2011), Brad Binder (2017) and Alex Marquez (2018) are the only other riders who have stood on the podium in the Moto2™ class in Valencia.

With Iker Lecuona, second last year at Valencia, replacing Miguel Oliveira in MotoGP™, former Red Bull MotoGP Rookies Cup rider Sean Dylan Kelly will substitute the Spaniard at American Racing Team KTM. Along with his teammate Joe Roberts, this will be the first time there are two American riders in Moto2™ since Misano/2011 with Kenny Noyes and Jake Gagne.

Moto3™ Facts and Stats

2019 Moto3™ World Champion, Lorenzo Dalla Porta won for the fourth time this season at Sepang, the fifth time of his Grand Prix career, equalling 2012 Moto3™ World Champion Sandro Cortese in 12th place on the list of riders with most wins in Moto3™, one less than Miguel Oliveira, Aron Canet and Jack Miller.

Sergio Garcia crossed the line in second place at Sepang, which is his first podium finish on what was the 16th race in his Grand Prix career. In addition, Garcia became the third rookie to have stood on the podium this year so far, along with Celestino Vietti and Ai Ogura.

The two riders still in contention for the Rookie of the Year award in Moto3™ are separated by 24 points: Celestino Vietti and Ai Ogura.

Jaume Masia crossed the line in third place at Sepang, which is the fourth podium finish of his Grand Prix career, all of which have been this season. It was also his first podium since he was also third in Italy.

Second in the Championship, Aron Canet finished eighth at Sepang. He is 15 points ahead of Tony Arbolino and 16 ahead of Marcos Ramirez, and they are the only other riders still in contention to finish 2019 Moto3™ runner-up.

Following his 11th-place finish at the Malaysian GP, Romano Fenati has scored 978 points in the Moto3™ class. In Valencia, he could become the first rider to reach the milestone of 1000 points in the class.

18 different riders have won the 20 races that have taken place at the Valencia in the lightweight category: only Maverick Viñales (2011-2013) and Hector Faubel (2006-2007) managed to win twice.

Honda won for the 13th time this year at Sepang – two more than in 2018 – but the manufacturer has only won once in the Moto3™ class at Valencia, with Jorge Martin in 2017. Dani Pedrosa (125cc - 2002) is the only other Honda rider who has managed to win at this track in the lightweight category.

Can Öncü is the only rider currently competing full-time in the Moto3™ class who has won a Grand Prix race at Valencia.

Along with Can Öncü; Jakub Kornfeil (2015), Andrea Migno (2016), Marcos Ramirez (2017) and John McPhee (2018) are the only other riders on the current grid who have stood on the podium at Valencia in Moto3™.

Marc Marquez closes in on Mick Doohan

The second-place finish for Marc Marquez in Malaysia was the 94th time he has stood on the podium on what was his 126th start in the premier class of Grand Prix racing (74.6%), one less than five-time 500cc World Champion Mick Doohan:

Marc Marquez' second-place finish at the Malaysian GP was the 133rd time he has been on the podium in his Grand Prix career, six less than 12 + 1 World Champion Angel Nieto. Only four riders have been on the podium on more occasions in Grand Prix racing.

Alex Marquez is 2019 Moto2™ World Champion

Alex Marquez became the first rider to win the Moto2™ World Championship having previously clinched the Moto3™ title.

Marquez has stood on the podium 10 times this season so far and 23 times in the Moto2™ class, equalling Pol Espargaro, who is in fifth place on the list of riders with most podium finishes in the class, two less than Marc Marquez.

With his brother Marc Marquez having taken the Moto2™ title back in 2012, this is the first time two brothers have both clinched the title in the intermediate category.

In addition, with Marc also taking the 125cc title in 2010 and Alex the Moto3™ title in 2014, this is the first time that two brothers have won the Championship in two of the same classes of Grand Prix racing.

Marquez is the fifth Spanish rider to win the Moto2™ title along with Toni Elias, his brother Marc, Pol Espargaro and Tito Rabat.

Marquez is the eighth different Spanish rider to clinch the title in the intermediate category. Marquez' title is also 11th in the class for Spanish riders and the 52nd in Grand Prix racing.

With eight wins in Moto2™, Marquez is tied in sixth place on the list of riders with the most wins in the class with Andrea Iannone, Franco Morbidelli and Francesco Bagnaia.

Marquez sits in fourth place on the list of Spanish riders with the most wins in the class, behind his brother Marc [16], Tito Rabat [13] and Pol Espargaro [10].

With 23 podiums, Marquez is now tied in third place with Pol Espargaro on the list of Spanish riders with most podium finishes in the Moto2™ class.

With his pole position in Malaysia – his sixth of the season so far and 12th overall in Moto2™ – he now sits in fifth place on the list of riders with most pole positions in the class.

Lorenzo Dalla Porta takes three Moto3™ wins in a row

Lorenzo Dalla Porta's wins in the last three races put him seventh on the following list of riders to have scored three successive wins in the Moto3™ class since its introduction in 2012.

If Lorenzo Dalla Porta wins in Valencia, he will become the first rider to win four successive Moto3™ races. Considering the lightweight category, the last rider to have won four (or more) successive races is Marc Marquez, who did it twice in the 125cc Championship back in 2010.

On this day...

November 11th

At the 2012 Valencia GP, Dani Pedrosa won the MotoGP™ race in wet weather conditions 37.661 seconds ahead of wildcard Katsuyuki Nakasuga, which is the biggest winning margin since the introduction of the class in 2002.

At the same GP, Marc Marquez started from last on the Moto2™ grid due to a penalty. He moved up to 11th on the opening lap and eventually won the race, his 16th victory in the class.

November 12th

At the 2017 Valencia GP, Marc Marquez crossed the line in third place to clinch his fourth premier class title after incredible save at Turn 1 when he just took the lead to Johann Zarco.

At the same GP, Jorge Martin won the Moto3™ race from pole position, the first of his eight GP wins to date.

November 13th

At the 2016 Valencia GP, Jorge Lorenzo won the MotoGP™ race from Marc Marquez and Andrea Iannone. It was Lorenzo's 44th (and last) win with Yamaha. Lorenzo is in second place in the list of Yamaha riders with most premier class wins behind Valentino Rossi (56). His closest rival is Eddie Lawson with 26 wins.

At the same GP, Johann Zarco qualified on pole position, set the fastest lap of the race and won the Moto2™ race for the third time in the class along with Catalunya and Austria in 2016. This is Zarco's most recent GP win to date.

In Moto3™, Brad Binder won for the seventh time of the year in Valencia and gave KTM their 50th win in the class since its introduction back in 2012.
